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Chair's Message

Director's Message

It is with great pleasure that I write my first directors message for the Scottish Multiprofessional Maternity Development Group.

It has been a very exciting and busy year for both myself and the SMMDP. The programme has continued to grow and develop. With 59 courses throughout Scotland and 2 further courses in England, we have had a very successful year building on all the previous excellent work. It has been a privilege for me to meet the many different multiprofessional candidates and faculty members attending SMMDP courses throughout Scotland. I have been impressed with the dedication and enthusiasm that the maternity teams have for their work and for the very diverse services that they provide.

We have been working hard in the development of a new initiative to support staff working with critically ill women. In June 2010 we will launch our new course Maternity REACTS (Recognition, Evaluation, Assessment, Critical Treatment and Stabilisation). The development of this course has been a lot of hard work and I am indebted to the steering group for their work in developing the course, contributing the educational materials and providing the faculty for the pilot course.

I am pleased that again, as in previous years, the SMMDP has been able to purchase additional equipment in the region of £22,700 to provide health boards around the country with good quality simulation equipment which will be used not only on SMMDP courses but also within their own in house education sessions.

This year we have had closer links to the Clinical Skills Managed Educational Network and we hope to increase this involvement and cooperation over 2010-2011.

I wish to thank the SMMDG for their help and support and for those in the wider NES team that have provided help and guidance over the last year. Thanks also to those who have been faculty members over the year - we could not manage without you and I look forward to meeting more of you and working with you over this coming year. For those of you who have taken on the role of course leaders, again thank you for your time and dedication in ensuring that these courses are well organised, run smoothly and complete the relevant documentation back to SMMDP offices. I would particularly like to recognise and thank Hayley McDonald and Kate Silk for their sterling work which is completed on behalf of the SMMDP, and for their unstinting support and encouragement that they have provided me in my first year as director.

I look forward to this coming year and note that we already have 56 courses booked, so it looks as if we will be at least as busy in the coming year in supporting the multiprofessional team in providing good quality educational solutions, as we were last year.



Table and Graph 1 demonstrate the detailed increase in uptake of the SMMDP courses per professional discipline as discussed above. The bulk of candidates are still midwives as the professional group with the greatest number in maternity services, although fewer midwives have been able to attend courses in the past year compared to previous years, as it is proving increasingly difficult for midwives and neonatal nurses to be released for training due to increased workload in the service. Even if they attend on days off, they don't always get the time back as intended, again due to workforce pressures. Many midwives are due to recertify the first courses they attended 4 years ago so the training demand will not reduce.

We need to strive to maintain this level of multiprofessional participation, and increase efforts to inform junior medical staff from the various disciplines of this training opportunity.

Graph 2: A Comparison of Attendance per Health Board 2007–2009




Course Review and Development

Scottish Neonatal Pre-transport Care Course (SNPTCC)


Developed to provide further training in the care of the baby in a pre-transport situation and is designed to support the multiprofessional community maternity team. The overall aim is to provide candidates with the knowledge and skills to provide ongoing neonatal care following initial resuscitation. This course is very popular and demand is high, however, due to the Neonatal Transport staffing and training commitments there is a limit to the number of courses that can run. Therefore there is a 3 year rolling plan to bring this vital training to as many remote areas as possible. In 2009 five courses ran training 60 staff and five courses are planned for 2010.

This course was externally assessed in 2009 however we have still to receive the report and any recommendations

Typical course evaluations:

Extremely useful day. Very good to meet people from the retrieval teams we may be liaising with. I feel much more confident about dealing with emergencies.

Scottish Emergency Maternity Care Course (SEMCC)

The target candidates for this course are health professionals working in any situation where they may have to respond to either an unplanned delivery or maternity emergency when there are no maternity professionals on site or immediately available, or where they may have to assist a midwife where there are any emergencies.

In the past year the SEMCC course has run in Invergordon, Barra and North Berwick which were very well received, and there are 5 further courses booked for 2010. The number of staff accessing this course has steadily increased over the last 3 years.

There were some anxieties expressed by staff prior to attendance at this course, as they were concerned that the expectations of them were too high and that they were being asked to replace midwives. However, after attendance at this course these anxieties were dispelled, and more courses have been requested for 2010. This year 3 GP's attended training and we had concerns that this course would not meet their needs, however the training was well received by the GP's attending, who all evaluated the course highly, with one of the GP's commenting that they felt that they had gained in confidence and that they would like to attend a SCOTTIE in the future.





The SMMDP have always been willing to adapt courses to make improvements in their courses, and as a result the SEMCC has changed over this last year. The 2 main lectures have been shortened and many of the workshops now commence with a mini lecture or real life footage to demonstrate the relevant points. An appropriate DVD from Topical Television, along with a licence to broadcast, has been purchased to support the course.

Scottish Core Obstetric Teaching and Training in Emergencies (SCOTTIE) Course

Twelve SCOTTIE courses were run in 2009 in 7 different locations in Scotland. In the last report there were discussions around assessment of candidates and in 2009 we made changes to this process. There remains a pre-course MCQ and candidates are continually assessed where possible. Where the candidates have had an opportunity to lead or assist during a workshop they can be assessed. If they have not had an opportunity to do either during the workshop they are not assessed. The candidates are informed at the beginning of the course that this is to assist them in identifying areas where they may need to do some additional work or education, and to assist us to identify instructor potential. The vast majority (99%) compared to the last report (84%) described this assessment as appropriate. The course instructors have been satisfied with this change also.


There have been a number of suggestions made for changes to the course, as the workshop for 2nd twin and breech deliveries is always short for time. Some discussion and agreement on this took place at the trainer's day and it was suggested that we expand the section on twins in the manual, and concentrate the session on breech with a mention at the end of the session on internal podalic version. This change will be completed as soon as possible and the programme amended and reviewed. The sepsis chapter also requires to be reviewed and this too will be completed soon.

It has been noted that on some courses the demonstration on Post Partum Haemorrhage has at times been chaotic and not always a good demonstration for the candidates. There are a number of reasons for this, however limited time for the instructors to practice is probably the most problematic. It has been decided to script the PPH scenario so that those involved will be more informed in advance of the day and will know what part they will play in the demo. This has been tried on the last two SCOTTIES and a marked improvement on the demo has been noted, therefore hopefully resulting in a better learning experience for the candidates.

Scottish Neonatal Resuscitation Course

Over the last five years this course has had 1617 candidates completed with 118 courses being held across the country. In 2009 there have been 32 courses and some of our candidates have been recertified as it has been over 4 years since they first completed the course.

The manual requires to be updated. However, as the new ILCOR guidelines will be published in October 2010, this will be done later in the year, as it would be wise to make all required changes at the same time.

Scottish Routine Examination of the Newborn Course

The SMMDP were approached in 2009 by Plymouth who wished to access this course for their midwives, this was in part relating to workforce problems and a need for service redesign. The SMMDP have responded to this need and in October 2009 a trial course was run, with half of the instructors coming from Scotland and the remainder from the Plymouth team. Nine experienced instructors from Plymouth attended a bridging course in 2009 and 4 of these instructors have now completed their instructor candidacy successfully. Plymouth has agreed to cover all costs including the costs of administration.

The course ran very well and we had a number of instructors observing so that they would be prepared for the next course. The faculty worked well together and all involved found the experience very positive and felt that both groups added value to the course.

The examination training was in accordance with the English Newborn and Infant Physical Examination (2008) standards which are very similar to the Scottish Standard, therefore there was no need to change any of the content of the course.

Fifteen midwives attended the course, with 14 completing successfully. Five candidates did not attend due to various reasons. There were a lot of apprehensions about the course and many of the staff attending did not realise the amount of work that was required in preparation prior to the course. However these fears were alleviated during the course and the support mechanisms and preparation of the instructors/ mentors helped the candidates relax. Two further courses have been booked to run in Plymouth in 2010.

"I was very apprehensive about doing the course but I have found it very very good and I have really enjoyed it and have learnt lots of new skills. I hope that all the other midwives will be encouraged to do the course, as I cannot wait to be able to examine real babies."

The SRENC ran in Scotland on 4 occasions during 2009, with 56 midwives, 3 ANNP's, and 2 Neonatal nurses completing the course. Currently there are 5 courses booked for 2010 with more planned, and Ayrshire and Arran will be running their first course in July.

There has been little progress with the DVD on heart sounds mentioned in the last report. This has in part been due to work pressures in the clinical areas, however, this is hoped to be completed in 2010.

Scottish Generic Instructor Course

We continue to add to the instructor base by running two full generic instructor courses and bridging courses as required in 2009. This year we increased the numbers of Scottish Ambulance Service instructors, mainly as neonatal resuscitation trainers.

After consulting with the SMMDP instructors the recertification process has been agreed. In line with other organisations such as the resuscitation council, recertification will take place every 4 years. This assessment will be completed on the instructor's usual course and the SMMDP will alert the instructor concerned and the course leader when recertification is required. Standard documentation will be used.

Again we have found it difficult to get appropriate personnel to assess this course we hope to complete this in 2010.

Scottish Normal Labour and Birth Course

We have had no requests to run this course in 2009, although we have had requests from some areas looking for additional copies of the KCND resource. The PDF of this will be on our website for anyone to access.

Maternity REACTS

'Saving Mothers Lives' (CEMACH 2007) identified that the early detection of severe illness in mothers remains a challenge to all maternity professionals involved in their care. In addition, the fact that severe illness is relatively rare in pregnant women, combined with the normal changes in physiology associated with pregnancy and childbirth, compounds the problem. The report recommends the introduction of education and training which will improve detection rates and improve management of such women.

In response to this recommendation the SMMDP scoped the current provision for maternity professionals to access education in the care of the woman requiring obstetric high dependency care. Through this exercise it was identified that there was little accredited education available, thus the need to develop such a course was required. The SMMDP was in an ideal position to take forward this work and a steering group was formed in June to develop a suitable course.

The Future

The SMMDG along with NES have continued to provide courses that are

- Clinically relevant
- Evidence based
- Suitable for all professionals involved in maternity care
- Low cost
- Delivered by trained multiprofessional instructors
- Held in local centres throughout Scotland.

These skills based courses have now been adopted and integrated into professional development programmes across the whole of Scotland. There has been a lot of interest in England and the SMMDP are supporting Plymouth with Examination of the Newborn. This venture has allowed us to increase our income generation, while still offering a cost effective course.

Candidates and service continue to support these courses and 60 courses are now booked for the year. The courses are evaluated by candidates as excellent and meeting their educational needs.

Most of the courses have been externally evaluated, although the programme as a whole has not, so this evaluation has been incorporated into 2010-2011 plans.

The Examination of the Newborn course is beginning in some areas to demonstrate changes in service delivery to meet the needs of both tertiary and the remote and rural units. With the development of the Maternity REACTS course the SMMDP is meeting a huge gap in educational provision for critically ill obstetric women. This course will need time to be embedded into the programme.

Ongoing funding from March 2011 from the Scottish Government and NES has still to be confirmed. There is a need for us to work together to secure a long term future for the SMMDP, as this programme is greatly valued.

The Scottish Multiprofessional Maternity Development Programme aims, through a network of local trainers, to provide local, affordable, postregistration courses to all professionals in the maternity service team.

The courses provide additional knowledge, skills, competencies and confidence to provide improved maternity care for women and their babies across Scotland

Scottish Routine Examination of the Newborn Course (SRENC)

A standardised national training course for all maternity-care professionals in the knowledge and skills required for the routine examination of the newborn.






Scottish Core Obstetric Teaching and Training in Emergencies (SCOTTIE)

For all maternity-care professionals who wish to enhance their knowledge and skills of unexpected obstetric emergencies which require an escalation of care.

Scottish Neonatal Resuscitation Course (SNRC)





Enhancing skills and knowledge of the recognition and management of critically ill obstetric women requiring high dependency care.



Provides a standardised, qualityassured method of training Instructors to support the Scottish Multiprofessional Maternity Development Programme.



Scottish Emergency Maternity Care Course for nonmaternity care professionals (SEMCC)

This course is designed to support health care professionals in the remoter parts of Scotland, to equip them to respond to emergencies arising in pregnant or newly delivered women and their babies.



Scottish Neonatal Pre-transport Care Course (SNPTCC)

Designed for community maternity care professionals to prepare them to provide unexpected ongoing neonatal care prior to emergency transport. This course is run by members of the Scottish Neonatal Transport Service with support from the SMMDP.
